

2015 Schools Competition Registration – Frequently Asked Questions:

To help with planning and registering for this year's Schools Competition, we have answered a few frequently asked questions below:

1) How do I register on the website?

You will need a username and password, which was emailed out with your registration pack. If you did not receive this let us know and we will send you a copy.

- Go to: <http://dav.com.au> and select the “log in” link in the top right-hand corner of the page.
- Select the school log in option and enter your credentials
- You will be redirected to a page with a link “start registration for the Schools Competition”, click here.
- Now select your two region preferences and select “continue”.
- You will then need to indicate the number of teams you would like to enter in each grade and you will be directed to enter student names.

The whole process should take five minutes. If you encounter any difficulties, please let us know.

2) When will schools be invoiced and what are this year's fees?

Invoices for team registration and this year's membership fee will be emailed in the week following close of registration (Wednesday 18 February). This year's fee table is published on the DAV website: <http://dav.com.au/schools/fees.php>

3) How many students can I have on a team?

The minimum number for any team is **four** and the maximum is **nine**. We encourage schools to register fewer teams with more students on each individual team, as this helps to prevent forfeits due to student commitments and illness. This year we will be strictly enforcing team numbers, so please ensure you meet these requirements.

4) Do I need to enter student names when I register?

While it is fine to leave student names blank at the time of registration you **must** enter these by the time your first round debates begin. This information is used to calculate speaker scores for our annual Swannie Awards and to monitor teams throughout the competition and during finals. If you have not entered speaker names by round one, your team may be withdrawn from further rounds.

5) What do I do if I need to change my registration?

You have until the registration cut-off date (Wednesday 18 February) to add or remove teams from your registration. If you wish to add or remove a team after this date, you will need to discuss this with us. Teams removed before the first round of debates will not incur a registration fee, however, if the team is removed less than a week before the first debate, you may be levied a forfeit fine.

6) Which region should I register in?

This is up to you, but we strongly recommend you select your region based on convenience of dates rather than convenience of location. Regions marked with an asterisk on the 2015 Schools Competition Dates sheet in your registration pack are likely to fill to capacity (it is first come, first served).

7) Which key dates should I have in my diary?

8) Help! It's my first time coordinating and I'm not sure how this works!

Each year, the DAV also publishes brief resource guides for prepared topics in the Schools Competition. These guides are designed for students help guide their research.  - Tips on how to adjudicate debates and coach a debating team; and
 - Seminars on dealing with definitional debates, secret topics and using rebuttal to win debates.
- You will also receive a comprehensive set of materials to use throughout the year.

Session Information

Introduction to Debating ***Charisma Taylor***

A beginners' guide to the aims, benefits and rules of debating. This session will cover the format of 3 vs. 3 debating, including the rules of debate, speaker roles and assessment criteria. It will also provide resources and activities for teachers to use to assist students to develop the basic skills involved in preparing and presenting an argument.

Charisma has been the DAV's Executive Officer since 2006. She has been involved in training students, teachers, and adult debaters for the last 9 years. She has co-created and managed pilot initiatives such as the Junior Public Speaking, Primary Schools and Public Speaking programs.



Principles of Adjudication ***Tom Sutherland***

The adjudication sessions will teach how to judge debates in a fair and consistent fashion and will focus on the three key criteria which adjudicators use in deciding debates: manner, matter and method.

The afternoon seminar will provide the basis of an understanding of how debates are adjudicated. By explaining the criteria adjudicators use to judge a debate, the session aims to aid staff in understanding what is required of students. This will ensure that they can make the most of the feedback they are given by adjudicators. We will also cover the exhibition debate, scoring and definitions, and any queries or questions raised by participants in the session.

Session Information (continued)



Principles of Adjudication **Tom Sutherland**

The morning session will assume prior knowledge of adjudication principles. It will briefly recap what staff will have learnt in past introductory adjudication sessions and extend on that base knowledge with a more comprehensive and in depth look at adjudication criteria. It will explain how the DAV trains adjudicators and the ways in which adjudicators assess, analyse and weigh up the three key criteria.

Tom is the current Vice-President (Adjudication and Training) of the DAV, of which he has been a member for the past seven years, and has run many training sessions for beginning adjudicators as part of this position. In the past, he has also represented The University of Melbourne as an adjudicator at the Australian, Australasian, and World University Debating Championships. Outside of debating, he is presently a doctoral candidate in the Media and Communications program at the same university.

Advanced Debating Strategy (Case development & hard/soft lines) **Kiran Iyer**

This session aims to extend on previous debating knowledge. It will look at advanced research techniques and present ideas for enhancing rebuttal. As well as looking at how to improve presentation, we will also examine the principles involved in building a case – hard/soft lines, use of models, and winning definitional debates.



Kiran Iyer debated with the DAV throughout high school and adjudicated for the DAV while completing an Arts/Law degree at Monash University. Kiran was a member of the winning team representing Monash at both the Australasian Intervarsity Debating Championships in 2012 and the World Universities Debating Championships, also in 2012. Kiran has been involved with coaching teams in the DAV Schools Competition for many years, and is a founder of African Voice, a non-for-profit offering debating and public speaking training throughout Africa.

Exhibition Debate

As well as the four training sessions, we will be showing an exhibition debate featuring adult members of the DAV. This will provide staff with the opportunity to see a high quality debate and raise any questions or comments they might have on the three key criteria (manner, matter and method), case structure and different styles of debating.

The debate will be a particularly useful point of discussion for the sessions that will follow and provide staff a good point of reference for understanding the basics of debating as well as both adjudications and advanced debating strategies.

Debaters Association of Victoria Junior Programs 2015

Opportunities for junior secondary school students in Years 7–9

Junior Secondary Program (JSP)

The Junior Secondary Program (JSP) is an introduction to debating for junior secondary students in Years 7–8 that provides training in the basic skills and structure of debating, and gives students an opportunity to do three ‘friendly’ debates. The JSP runs over four evenings through August, September and October (Terms 3 and 4).

When: Terms 3 and 4

Where: Regions including Armadale, Balwyn, Brighton, Brunswick, Bundoora, Cranbourne East, Croydon, Essendon, Geelong, Ivanhoe, Kew, McKinnon, Mentone, Mt Waverley, Richmond, Taylors Lakes, Toorak, Warragul and Werribee

Who: Students in Years 7–8

Cost: Beginning at \$120 per team (4–7 students)

Registration: Regional dates will be emailed to coordinators who will then be able to register online via the DAV website.

Junior Public Speaking Competition

Every year the DAV runs a state-wide Junior Public Speaking Competition for students in Years 7–9. The program aims to give young speakers the opportunity to put their ideas forward in front of an audience whilst expanding their knowledge of current affairs. Students will develop the “building blocks” of public presentation—confidence, clarity, and the development of arguments—which are very important skills both in and out of school.

The competition in 2014 will run across one school day in Term 2, commencing with a training session led by DAV instructors. Finals will then be held throughout Terms 3 and 4.

External Services 2015

Offering adjudication and training services across Victoria

Adjudication Services

The DAV can provide experienced debating and/or public speaking adjudicators for internal/house competitions, friendly interschool debates and associated school competitions. We also have adjudicators and debaters available for public events.

Training Services

The DAV can provide training to students and staff according to your school's needs. Below is a sampling of available training packages, which can be modified or combined to suit your needs.

Introduction to debating

This session covers speaker roles, scoring, adjudication criteria, definitions and basic case preparation. Students will apply the theory that they have learnt by participating in skills building activities throughout the session.

Special introductory rate of \$60/hr for training in February/March for up to 12 students

Topic preparation

This session looks at how to best prepare cases for different kinds of topics, from normative to empirical. It also explains the difference between 'hard' and 'soft' case lines, and the use of models.

Secret topic preparation

This session incorporates elements from the "topic preparation" session, but is targeted more specifically at preparing in limited time. Students will learn and practise processes for preparing to deadlines as well as techniques for brainstorming more widely.

Rebuttal workshops

This session aims to educate students in effective rebuttal which targets the opposition's primary arguments and identifies their flaws. Students will also be taught to identify key themes in the debate, and how to use these to structure their rebuttal and highlight their own team's strengths

British Parliamentary debating

This session teaches the basics of British Parliamentary style debating, including format and speaker roles. These sessions can also include a practice debate.

Public Speaking

This sessions look at different styles of presentation, considering pace, volume, pitch and expression. It also explores different structures for speeches and tips for impromptu speaking.

Staff training

The DAV runs a Teacher Inservice at the beginning of each year to help coordinators and coaches learn more about debating and develop skills to pass this information on to their students. The 2015 Teacher Inservice will be held on **Monday 23rd February**.

The DAV can run any of its teacher training modules in-house. These include: Basics of Debating, Basics of Adjudicating, Public Speaking and Advanced Debating Strategy. All sessions aim to provide staff with basic theory and ways to workshop these theories to educate your students. Teacher resources are provided.

Training & Adjudication rates: \$77/first hour, \$55/subsequent hours (per trainer)

Staff training rates: \$45/head for 90minute session (min 3 participants)

Travel levy: no cost for training held within 50km of Melbourne CBD,
\$25 (50–100km from CBD), \$40 (100–150km from CBD), \$75 (150+km from CBD)

Debate Camp

Debate Camp is a non-residential debating ‘camp’ for students in Years 10–12 which runs over three days during the Easter and Spring school holiday periods. The camp will include matter sessions on recurring debating themes (e.g. the role of government, the legal system), workshops to improve practical debating skills, and daily secret topic debates led by DAV accredited trainers.

Easter Debate Camp (End of Term 1 Holidays)

When: Monday 30 March to Wednesday 1 April

Where: Melbourne High School

Who: Students in Years 10–12

Cost: \$180 including morning tea and lunch

Spring Debate Camp (End of Term 3 Holidays)

When: Thursday 1 to Saturday 3 October

Where: TBC

Who: Students in Years 10–12

Cost: \$180 including morning tea lunch

The DAV is able to offer a limited number of equity places for students from under-resourced schools. Further details can be obtained from the DAV office.

Registration information is available from the DAV website. As places are limited, a maximum of 5 students are permitted to attend from each school.

Training Resources

The DAV has released a training DVD “Guide to Debating” which has been designed by experienced DAV trainers to give your students the best opportunity at succeeding in debating competitions. The Guide includes different levels of training, demonstration debates, and teacher resources on a separate CD-ROM. Copies can be ordered from the DAV office for \$95.

The debating ‘bible’ is the Australia-Asia Debating Guide. Copies are available from the DAV office for \$17.50 (incl. GST). It is written in a generally-accessible style and is recommended for anyone wanting to better understand the mechanics of debating and adjudication. More information about the AADG and downloadable chapters are available online at our website. The DVD and AADG can be purchased together for \$110 (incl. postage).
